# I. Legal Relief for HT survivors who are crime victims and witnesses

- a. CA Human Trafficking statutes and definitions
  - i. Liberty Deprivation with intent to:
    - 1. Force labor: Penal Code Sec. 236.1(a)
    - 2. Effect or maintain a listed sex offense with an adult: Penal Code Sec. 236.1(b)
  - ii. Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children (CSEC)
    - 1. Inducing or attempting to induce a minors into Commercial Sex: Penal Code Sec. 236.1(c)

# c. Towards a more victim-centered and trauma-informed approach to prosecution: Victims have *rights* if criminal charges are investigated and/or filed

- i. Marsy's Law: CA Const. Ar. 1, Sec. 28(b)
- ii. HT Victim-Caseworker Privilege: CA Evid. Code Sec. 1038-1038.2
- iii. HT victim confidentiality in public records: Pen. Code Sec. 293(e), Gov. Code 6254(f), 7923.615(c)
- iv. HT victim as John Doe / Jane Doe in Court: Pen. Code Sec. 293.5
- v. Court-issued Protective Orders
  - 1. EPO (if also DV): Pen. Code Sec. 646.91
  - 2. Civil TRO / Order after Hearing (CA Civ. Code Sec. 527.6)
  - 3. CPO: PC 136.2
    - a. During Prosecution
    - b. Post Conviction
  - 4. All carry firearms ban: Felony to possess per Pen. Code Sec. 29826

- vi. Court Protections for witnesses in court
  - 1. Protect from undue harassment or embarrassment: Pen. Code Sec. 765(a)
  - 2. Special care for witnesses under 14: Pen. Code Sec. 765(b)
  - 3. Nonthreatening court environment for witnesses under 16: Pen. Code Sec. 868.6
  - 4. Two support persons of victim's own choosing: Pen. Code Sec. 868.5
- vii. Court protections for HT Victims
  - 1. Exploiter's character can support victim testimony as proof that exploiter is the kind of person who would commit human trafficking
    - a. Cases charging sex crimes: Evid. Code Sec. 1108
    - b. Cases also charging domestic violence: Evid. Code Sec. 1109
  - 2. No victim blaming or shaming allowed!
    - a. Expert witnesses can explain effects of trafficking on a victim: Evid. Code Sec. 1107.5
    - b. Lawyers can't use evidence of a victim's sexual history or history of engaging in commercial sex acts to attack their credibility or character: Evid. Code Sec. 1161(b)
      - i. "History" means any time before the trial: *People v. Calhoun* 2019 38 Cal.App.5<sup>th</sup> 275
- viii. HT Victim rights after a criminal conviction
  - 1. Court orders exploiter to pay full restitution for all economic losses suffered as a result of the crime: *Marsy's Law*, CA Penal Code Sec. 1202.4(f)(3)
  - 2. Trafficking victims can apply to CA VCB for lost income during the time they were trafficked: Gov. Code Sec. 13957, 13957.2, 13957.5

# II. Legal Relief for HT Survivors if arrested, charged or convicted

- a. HT coercion is a defense for nonviolent offenses: Pen. Code Sec. 236.23(f), Pen. Code Sec. 667.5(c)
  - i. Coercion defined: Pen. Code Sec. 236.1(h) and In re D.C. (2021) 60 Cal.App.5<sup>th</sup> 915
- b. HT can reduce criminal sentences if a contributing factor
  - i. Prosecutor must consider as factor in mitigation: Pen. Code Sec. 1016.7
  - ii. Judge must consider as factor in mitigation: Pen. Code Sec. 1170
- c. Leaving HT can clear a survivor's criminal record of nonviolent arrests/convictions
  - i. Petition for vacatur: Pen. Code Sec. 236.14
    - 1. Filed in court and served on DA
      - a. Under seal to protect against trauma: victim-centered, trauma-informed approach
    - 2. Shows clear and convincing evidence that the arrest/conviction was the direct result of being a victim of HT and the victim is distancing themselves from the HT Scheme
    - 3. Prosecution has 45 days to file opposition or court may grant
    - 4. Court can allow survivor to appear through counsel or by phone/zoom if compelling reason
    - 5. Court can't refuse to hear if survivor still has fines/fees or failed probation
    - 6. Can file again if court denies it (without prejudice)
    - 7. If court grants it:
      - a. Verdict set aside, charges dismissed, records ordered sealed/destroyed
      - b. Deemed never to have occurred
      - c. Survivor may legally deny the arrest/conviction or refuse to acknowledge it
      - d. Records don't go to state licensing boards
